The Birth of Cayucos

For the next several months, I will reprint articles from The Sandpiper from 1989. The articles tell how Cayucos was born. The original articles, which were published in the Sun-Bulletin in 1961 were written by Sam Borradori. Whenever I read something about the history of Cayucos, Mr. Borradori seems to the main source. Reprinted with a little editing by Leonard Cicerello.

At the southerly end of the future town of Cayucos was located a thriving settlement called Old Creek. It was situated on a 30-acre parcel given the legal description of Lot 44 on the 1875 map of the subdivision of Rancho Morro y Cayucos. It was located at the strategic intersection of the San Luis Obispo-San Simeon Road and the road to Hot Springs, now known as Paso Robles. The four buildings are shown on an 1875 map and its location was downstream from the present Whale Rock Dam. It is sometimes referred to as Bain's Settlement.

The date of Old Creek's beginning is not known, but it probably started about 1855. Its first resident seems to have been John F. Bains, a schoolteacher, who was later joined by George Stone. It was the earliest polling place for the Morro Precinct, which covered the entire coastal area from the Pacific Ocean to the summit of the Santa Lucia Range, and from the San Luis Obispo to the San Simeon Precincts, which extended as far north as the Monterey County line.

A general merchandise store provided a convenient trading place for the large number of settlers on the fertile government land lying outside the two Mexican ranchos. It also provided a Stage Depot, saloon, eating place, and overnight accommodations for travelers to and from San Simeon, San Luis Obispo, and Hot Springs (Paso Robles), either by private conveyance or the stage line that also carried mail.
